## Narendra Modi plays the Trump card

Prime Minister Narendra Modi's first $\quad$ key areas of concern for both. meeting with US President Donald sina Hill and Washington, DC beltway watchers, a success for both countries. From an evenlymatched handshake to the deft signature Modi baby bear-hug(anotable feat given Trump'sgermphobia) to the joint statement, the "nofrills" summit, contrary to predictions of gloom, advanced the pace of India-US relations, but only modthe Trump administration-signals the growingbilateral engagement Indoingso it shows continuity rather than dramatic change from previous top-level interactions. And that's goodnews for India Consider the following:Thejoint st ment declared that both sides "resolved to expand and deepen the strategic partnership between the countries and advance common objectives", especially in "combating terrorist threats, promoting stability across the Indo-Pacific region, increasing free and fair trade, and strengthening energy linkages". This is boilerplate language from previous statements and the
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In geopolitical terms the region-stretching from the Persian Gulf tothe Pacific Ocean-and concern over a more assertive China is centre stage and thejoint statement makes several references to its significance: The US and India will be "joint stewards" to ensure "peace and stability in the region", uphold international law, freedom of navigation, overflight, and commerce, and the peaceful putes in accordance with international law the importance the Malabar naval exercises and the shaing of "white shipping" data in achieving these objectives; and, as a corollary, the sale of the naval unarmed version of the Predator drone and support for India's entry into various non-proliferation groups, notably the NuclearSuppliers Group. While the statementalso makes geopolitical referencesto Afghanistan, India's "Think West" policy, and North Korea's nuclear and missile provocations, it is clear that China (without being mentioned) is the primary focus. Pakistan remains de-hyphenated, and

 unable or unwilling to prevent cross-bordictably Islacksforntiterritory. Pre dictably, islamabad hasrejected hejoint non-dilo withboth Washing New Delhi.In geo-economic terms, the emphasis was "to find creative ways to improvebilateral trade", and radically-given Trump's rejection of the Paris Agreement-"a rational approach that balances environment and climate policy, global economic development, and energy security needs". The latter has translated into a call for the US to remove barriers for the export of more natural gas, clean coal, andrenewable energy sources to India. Similarly, the
statementalso expectsforward movement
on the sale of six nuclear reactors, while disregarding the fact that the bankrupt US nucleargiant Westinghouse might notb didn'supply hereactos. Mod, clearly, The mphasis of thejointenghouse Topolitics especially the Indo-Pacificand counter-terrorism, and reo-economics, particularly energy and trade, reveals that the primary drivers of the first TrumpModi meeting were the White House notably the National Security Council (NSC), the Pentagon, the department of energy, and, only thereafter, the state department. This is unsurprising given that the statedepartment hasstill not nominated an assistant secretary of state for South Asia or an ambassador to India. In contrast, the NSC and the Pentagonin par
icular have benefited from the presence of seasoned experts on India and theiropera-ional-level interactions with New Delhi. The statement also reveals the influ-nceofbotom-up operational activities, xas ane ongoing and expanding nava ions, perennial support for India's permanen membership of the UN Security Council, which are not backed by any workingevel cooperation.
Similarly, the statement also includes is clear disapreemen in areas where there sides. For instance Modi's Think West policy which calls for engagement with every key actor in theregion, from Israel to Saudi Arabia to Iran, is at odds with Trump's efforts to move closer to Saudi Arabia and isolate Iran. Against this back drop, the call to "increase cooperation enhance diplomatic consultations, and increase tangible collaboration with part nersin the Middle East islikely toremain a non-starter, unless the two sides can work out how to resolve differences and ensure theirmutual interests.

Finally, there is a cleardistinction in the svalue'-based approach of Modi and the more 'interest' and transactional approach of Trump. In his Wall Street Journalop-ed and his opening comments at the Whit House, Modi stressed "shared values" and emphasized the need for the world'soldes and largest democracies to work togethe In contrast, the transactionally-focused Trump highlighted India's purchase of the Sea Guardian drone. This underlines the need for New Delhi to stress interests ove values, especially when dealing with the thump aus istanon. Semantics apart, is no mean achievement piven that rela tions betweenthe US and some fitsclos estallies havebecomedistinctly frosty and frayed. Clearly, in the firstround Modi ha played the Trump card to his advantage.
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
