NEW DELHI: The Maldives perceives Indiaasa "specialfriend" and will be sensitive to the country's security and strategic concerns, the country's foreignminister Abdulla Shahid said on Monday,reflectingMale'sefforts torebalanceties with New Delhi and Beijing.

Shahid, in New Delhi for discussions with hisIndian counterpart Sushma Swaraj ahead of Maldives Prime Minister IbrahimMohamed Solih'sfirst visitto the country and to explore ways todeal with the financial crisisin Maldives, said India will"always be a specialfriend". "India is the largest contributor of our development for decades. China contributes the largest touristarrivals and has been generous in assistance. We will not compare friends but we have friends and special friends," he told ANI,

Solih's surprise victory in the September general election providedanopportunity forIndiato improverelations with the Indian Oceanarchipelago, which dipped to an all-time low under former president Abdulla Yameen.

dives-India relationship is on a betterfooting," he said.

Beijing poured billions of dollarsintoinfrastructure projects and Solih's aides have said the Chinese debtcould bemorethan $\$ 1.5$ billion, or more than a quarter of the Maldives' annual GDP.
"Yameen has taken the country to the brink of bankruptcy. We need urgent assistance to (cope with) the budget issues we arehaving," hesaid.Headded the newgovernment of the Maldives is looking for "generous assistance" from India and other countriesfor coping with this debtand delivering on promises it has made to the people.

Shahidalso said the Maldives will retain two Indian military helicopters, which Yameen wanted toreturn toIndia. "They are being used for humanitarian purposes... We are grateful to Indiafor providing these. We will continuetoengage with Indiafor allourneeds andrequirements," hesaid.
Astatementfrom theexternal affairsministryquotedSwarajas saying that India attaches the "highest importance" to its ties with theMaldives andinline with thegovernment "Neighbourhood First" policy, and New Delhi is ready to fully support Male in terms of socio-economic development.
Thestatement quoted Shahid as reiterating his government's "India First" policy and saying that the Maldives looks forward to working closely with India on all issues.
The foreign ministers agreed Solih's state visit to India will takeplace on December 17. They alsodiscussed waystostrengthen the bilateral development partnership. "India assured the Maldives of supportinimplementing its development priorities andin ensuring fiscal and budgetary stability," the statement said.
Swaraj and Shahid also discussed security and defencematters, including ongoing projects and new areas of cooperation. They agreed to hold the next meeting of the Defence Cooperation Dialogue in the first half of December.

Shahid, who wasaccompanied by finance minister Ibrahim Ameer and economic development minister Fayyaz Ismail, also met defence minister Nirmala Sitharaman.
