## India, Myanmar hold talks, discuss return of displaced Rohingya

New Delhi: India and Myanmar held the 17th round of Foreign Office Consultations to review bilateral ties with focus on defence and security ties. The two countries discussed the situation in the Rakhine state and the return of displaced Rohingyas as Myanmar's army and civilian leadership, according to an AFP report, on Friday held a rare "national security" meeting to discuss an internal investigation into the Rohingya crisis.

While the Indian side was led by foreign secretary Vijay Gokhale, Myanmar was represented by UMyint Thu, permanent secretary, Myanmar ministry of foreign affairs.

During the discussions, the two sides reviewed the complete range of bilateral relations, including high level visits, security and defence related issues, boundary matters and border management, trade and commerce, development cooperation, connectivity, cultural and consular matters.

"They also exchanged views on sub-regional, regional and global issues of mutual interest," said the government in a statement.
