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# Show how schemes improve lives: PMO tells ministries 

## REVIEW Decision after August review meeting of the projects by PM Modi

NEWDELH: The PrimeMinister's Office has asked ministries in charge of key infrastructure projects and schemes to not just ensure the completion of these between August and Marchnext year - the next parliamentary elections are due shortly afterbut also showcase how these have changed lives for the better, according to the minutes of a August review meeting of the projects by PrimeMinister Narendra Modi.
The unprecedented outcome monitoring points to one of the main election plans of the Bharatiya Janata party-led National Democratic Alliance governmentinnext year's elections. On August 2, the PM reviewed the Augus 2, Pu the tructure projects, and other tructure projects, and other chemes across ministries highways, houses for eligible amilies, railways.
The decision to focus on outcome based monitoring comes amidst frequent criticism from opposition parties that many projects and schemes havefailed o deliver on the ground.
According to theminutes, the deadlines set by the PMO come with "actionsteps", whichaim to

not just assess measurable outcome of schemes, like spending or asset creation, but their impact on beneficiaries life and living standards. For instance, all ministries have been told to carry outa astudy about the "positiveimpact on theenvironment" of various schemes of different ministries by October 31
Besides, ministries have been directed to conduct internal workshops about the "good governance, innovation and efficiency increase which has been implemented in ministries and the benefits these have brought for improving the life of a commonman."

The PMO has also told all ministries to balance the budget in terms of "regional coverage" and that it should be "outcome oriented."
AmitabhKant, CEO offederal think tank NITI Aayogsaid such outcome-based monitoring has
led to reforms in many key sec tors including education and health.

Such monitoring helps to check if what is said in review meetings abouta scheme is actually getting translated on the ground. This also ensures that the Centre, states and districts works in tandem," he said. Kant was among the about two dozen officers whoattended the August 2meting chaired by Modi

Public polley experts, how er, ane om, of much help as long as the gov ernment does not address gap in implementation.
"This government is in a hurry toget the various schemes and programs off the ground. It has opened up far too many programs, some of which have epi sodic impacts. The reason is poorly designed policies and schemes, which makes their
implementation problematic," said Sebastian Morris, professor of economics at the Indian Institute of Management, Ahmeda bad. He said the real failure is the top down approach of the government where inputsfrom those with their feet on the ground, stakeholders, civil soci ety are not encouraged.
"This is despite the success of the Jyoti Gram Yojnain Gujarat, since the problems at the national level cannot all be projectised butrequireinnovation indesignand theright organisa tions, besides coordinatio across multiple departments, Morris said. Among the infrastructure ministries, the main focus areas of the government are roads, housing railways, aviation, and ports.

For instance, therural devel opment ministry has been directed to expedite provision land to3.94lakh landless eligible beneficiaries by December while the housing ministry has been told to finalise the nationa urban rental policy and model tenancy act by October

Rajiv Kumar, NITI Aayog' vice chairman said this kind of outcome-based monitoring helps in improving not only delivery of service but speed implementation on the ground.
