# 'Big crackdown against Maoists' overground supporters planned'

NEWDELH: Afirst-time concerted crackdown has been launched against 'overground'Maoistsupporters in various states and about 500 such people have been apprehended by the security forces in Chhattisgarh alone over the last one year, the chief of country'sleadanti-Naxaloperations force, the CRPF, has said.

CRPF director general RR Bhatnagar told PTI in an interview that this fresh action is being undertaken in coordination with the state police to deny 'space' to the so-called left-wing extremists(LWE), and to counter them beyond thefield operations.

The Central Reserve Police Force(CRPF) hasdeployed close to onelakh armedpersonnel and a heavy assortment of weapons and gadgets to tackle the LWE.
"Wearenow going to the villages to see action is taken against (Maoists') overground supportersand workers, 'janmilitia' and other people who give them the intelligence and local support.
"More than 500 people have been taken into custody in past one year in Chattisgarh. We are seeing toit that(Naxals') overall

supportisalsoreduced," he said. A senior official heading aspecial combat unit later said all thosefound to havinghelped the Naxalite cadres in planning, aiding and executing an attack on security forces are the ones primarily on their radar, and are being tracked and apprehended or arrested as part of this new strategy to counter the LWE.

Bhatnagar, a 1983-batch IPS officer of Uttar Pradesh cadre, said theCRPF was increasingits footprints in core Naxal areas, and has opened at least 15 new campsinthehighly impenetrable andinhospitablejungles and terrains of south Bastar region.
"... 160 Naxals have been neutralised in variousstates and the number ofincidents(anti-Maoist
operations) are maximum in Chhattisgarh, after Jharkhand."

TheDG said he hastaken some major policy decisions to better orient his combat units for successin operations withoutsufferingmajorreverses. "Wehavealso hardened our defences... placed emphasis that it is not only special forces like the CoBRA (specialised jungle warfare unit of CRPF) who have to be competent but also the GD (general duty) battalion troops that need to be properly trained as they are the ones who are mostly deployed and facemaximumattrition."
"Wehavefocussedtomakeour general duty battalion component very strong. We have infused the concept of youngplatoons, boys who are fit and welltrained and able to counter. We have also recently introduced about 5,000 new young recruits after their training," the DG said.

Bhatnagar added that as a result of these policy and operational changes, theforce has been able to successfully "break" the killingring withoutsufferingany casualty within during three or four severe attempts of ambush by the Naxals this year, the force has been able and they affected injury to the attacking party.
