# India likely to ink $\$ 2.5 b n$ deal for stealth frigates during Putin visit

NEWDELHI: India and Russia are likely to sign a $\$ 2.5$ billion deal for four more Krivak/Talwar classstealthfrigatesfor thenavy on Friday when Prime Minister Narendra Modi and President Vladimir Putin meet for the annual India-Russia summit, two senior officialsfamiliar with the matter said on Wednesday.
Two of the warships will be constructed at the Yantar Shipyard in Kaliningrad and the remaining two at the Goa Shipyard Limited (GSL). HT had reported on September 12 that the deal was likely to be inked during the summit.
Indiainked an Inter-Governmental Agreement (IGA) with Russia for the four frigates in

The new Grigorovich-class 'Project 1135.6 ' frigates will be powered bygas turbine engines to be supplied by Ukrainianfirm Ukroboronprom's Gas Turbine Research\&Production Complex Zorya-Mashproekt.
The two countries will also sign a $₹ 39,000$-crore deal for the
supply of Russian S-400 Triumf air defence missile systems to India. The S-400 is capable of destroying incoming aerial targets at a range of 400 km .

Defence minister Nirmala Sitharaman, who was on an official visit to Kazakhstan and Krgystan till Oct 6, cutshorther visit to attend the India-Russia summit, said an official familiar with the development.

India is in talks with the US to secure a sanctions waiver as its military is heavily dependenton Russian equipment. Air force (IAF) chief Air Chief Marshal BS Dhanoa said the Countering America's Adversaries Through Sanctions Act (CAATSA) was unlikely to come in the way of the deal. He said the first deliveries would take place after two years of the signing of the contract.
